I have just returned from co-leading a small group of Ignatian Wisdom Fellows on the Ignatian Camino (by bus) from Bilbao to Barcelona and then finishing in Rome. We were tracing the footsteps of Ignatius as he developed from a child, through his "cannonball conversion" to a senior leader, and making connections between his life and our own. The similarities and contrasts were revelatory—most so as we explored the art and architecture of the times. The art in Spain and Rome is reflective of a wild religious imagination. We visited mystical places such as Monserrat and Manresa and encountered the Black Madonna and Our Lady of Arantzazu. Rome was full of pilgrims in this jubilee year. We went to the Vatican and saw the Pope during his Wednesday audience in a capacity crowd in St. Peter's Square. To see the faith that brought pilgrims from all over the world to the eternal city was inspiring.

Now, coming home to the holiday season—Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year—festive times with memories and stories of surprise, kindness, joy, and laughter. Do not let your troubles douse the hope of the season, the light that casts out darkness, and the love offered in a manger. This is a time of giving and receiving gifts. Do not miss what is offered as generations connect and collide. Listen deeply to your heart and the hearts of family and friends.

My reading recommendations for December are by Doc Seuss: *The Grinch* for Christmas and *You're Only Old Once* for those approaching or immersed in retirement. And read Christmas classics, watch Christmas movies. Catch, embody, and extend the Christmas Spirit!
